

Title: Ordnance Survey and ONS discovery work 2017-2018
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This presentation showcases joint public policy discovery projects between Office for National Statistics and Ordnance Survey, 2017-2018. We ask the following questions: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What happens when data from the NMA, Ordnance Survey (OS) is combined with data from the NSI, Office for National Statistics (ONS)? • Can this joint approach provide tools, data and analysis to inform local policymaking? <p>Three case studies describe how we assess innovative methods to integrate different types of data and draw conclusions about aspects of life around newly defined spatial scales, using a range of economic and social data to present a more detailed picture than was previously possible. Ongoing work involves testing research with stakeholders, with a view to developing an approach that can be replicated for other areas and ultimately scaled up for national use.</p> <p>Case study 1: Natural Capital</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Showcasing the benefits of integrating geographic and statistical data in order to value and monitor the extent and condition of nature in the urban environment and recognise the services it provides <p>Case study 2: High Streets</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Integrating new data sources to identify high street extents and their attributes <p>Case Study 3: Midland Metro</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessing whether improved connectivity changes the economic and societal features of areas close to new tram stops, relative to the wider area
